Categorical Exclusion - Section 605 of HFRA (16 U.S.C.6591d)

Project Goals

- Increase ecosystems' resilience to current and future large-scale disturbances.
- 2) To extend and connect the multijurisdictional cooperative fuelbreak.
- To provide for community, public and firefighter safety by mitigating hazardous trees and reducing fuel loads.

Project Objectives

- 1) Reduce hazard trees, ladder fuels, surface fuels, and maintain and improve the historic strategic fuelbreak.
- 2) Utilize prescribed burning consisting of pile burning, jackpot burning and/or broadcast burning to reduce fuel loads and improve resilience to the landscape.

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Proposed Action - 1,088 acres of hazardous fuels reduction treatments

- > 100% treatment acres occur within the WUI
 - > 766 acres are in the WUI defense zone of which 494 acres overlap the California spotted owl (Strix occidentalis occidentalis) protected activity center (PACs)
 - > 322 acres are in the WUI threat zone of which 123 acres overlap the California spotted owl PACs
 - ➤ 154 acres are in the California spotted owl Home Range Core Areas (HRCAs)
 - ➤ The remaining 317 acres occur outside the PACs and HRCAs.
- > 3 different treatment activities
 - Hazardous Fuels Reduction (Mechanical removal of shrubs and conifer trees (3"-10" dbh and up to 12" dbh for operational access), mastication, and hand thinning)
 - Mechanical Tree Removal and Forest Health Improvements (Removal of dead and dying trees up to 30" dbh)
 - ➤ Hazard Tree Mitigation Following the Hazard Tree Identification and Mitigation (March, 2022)

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Management Requirements

Consistent with the Forest Plan and minimize potential impacts to the applicable resource.

Extraordinary Circumstances

- > Aquatics
 - > No critical habitat for any Threatened and Endangered Species
- > Heritage
 - > Project is designed so that no adverse effects will occur.
- > Sensitive Plants and Terrestrial Wildlife
 - > Sensitive Plants are present and should be avoided
 - ➤ Most of the area is in PACs. PACs were surveys in 2016 Resurvey for occupancy and determine need for LOPs.

Categorical Exclusion - Section 605 of HFRA (16 U.S.C.6591d)

Decision


Meets the requirements of this categorical exclusion: Section 605 of HFRA (16 U.S.C.6591d)

- ➤ Is located in the WUI or in CC2 or 3 in Fire Regime Groups I, II, or III
- Not located within wilderness or other restricted or prohibited areas
- ➤ Meets the collaborative process requirements of HRFA
- Maximizes the retention of old-growth and large trees
- > Promote stands that are resilient to insects and disease
- Reduce the risk of wildfires
- ➤ Was developed and will be implemented through a collaborative
- > Meeting the acreage requirement
- ➤ No permanent or temporary roads will be established
- Causes no extraordinary circumstances
